I would like to thank the senior high students for all their help with the set-up, decorating, and food preparations (and a certain someone, for your assistance with the sound system-much appreciated!). The following Tuesday, on the 20th, we had our annual school Christmas dinner, complete with fried chicken, meatballs, mashed potatoes, gravy, perogies, vegetables, dinner rolls, salad, and dessert. The K-12 also built and decorated gingerbread houses to take home, and on the last day before the winter break, we had a "relaxing" day of activities that included gnome making, cookie baking, yoga, board games, and a gym activity.

Lakeshore's land-based coordinator also spent some time with our 1-4 class making baskets while learning about patience, and our 5-12 students spent time chatting with Mr. Spence.

Our typical January weather usually involves many recesses spent inside due to temperature or wind, but this January was good to us! Now that we are expecting the polar vortex to bring colder weather, it is important for the students to continue to dress for the weather, both at recess and while being transported to and from school.

Our senior high students have the end of the semester to look forward to, with new courses beginning on February 6th. Most of our seniors will be taking either an InformNet or TMO (teacher mediated option) course, or both. This will be a change for them, as they will need to follow our school Day A and B schedule, as well as the 6-day school cycle calendar. For TMO, missed classes can found in the Google classroom so that students can listen to the audio recording and access all work that needs to be completed. It is important that they maintain steady attendance and work completion to encourage responsibility for their credit acquisition. Look for report cards to be sent home for senior students on February 10th.

The grade 11 and 12s will be attending the Red River Polytech Open-Door event on February 22nd, where there will be over 12 different program tours and an exhibition hall with information. And in May, we are planning for the grade 9-12 to attend the Skills Canada National Competition in Winnipeg where they will be able to learn about skilled trade and technology careers in a fun and interactive event, ask career questions, and watch over 45 skill competitions. (Of those, 25 will compete to represent Team Canada at the WorldSkills Competition in Lyon, France in 2024). More info will follow closer to this event.
